Oregon UU Voices for Justice Annual Meeting 2024



Plan to attend the 2024 annual meeting, to be held at the UU Fellowship of Corvallis on October 5. This year's timely theme is "Saving Democracy: We Are the Majority." The morning sessions will highlight two speakers: Steve Phillips, who will speak on "The New Majority: How We Win the Civil War" and Reyna Lopez, who will address "How We Can Support Latinx Candidates."



After lunch, which will be provided, there will be four breakout sessions, in which we will discuss short-term and long-term strategies for working on our four primary campaigns: (1) Deepening Democracy, (2) Environmental Justice, (3) Economic Inequality, and (4) Human Rights. This monthly meeting was special, in that author Katherine Stewart was invited to speak. She has written many books concerning our democracy and its present state. Her latest book is *The Power Worshippers*, which discusses "Christian" nationalists [<u>The Power Worshippers - Katherine Stewart</u>]. She spoke mainly about that subject at this meeting.

Many of Stewart's ideas—and the questions and statements of others during this meeting—were helpful in reminding us of two things: that we need to understand this particular group and what they hope to achieve, and to do the same with Project 2025. Knowing you are all probably very familiar with these two movements, I hope we can all ensure that others know about them also.

The following ideas were shared in the monthly Oregon UU Voices for Justice liaisons meeting in August. (To learn more about the liaisons, contact Oregonuuvoices@yahoo.com)

- Use resources available online from https://www.crnhq.org/
- If the conflict concerns Article II, post BOTH the Values and the Principles.
- Contact the UUA Pacific Western Region Office https://www.uua.org/pacific-western/staff. They are willing to meet with offended parties, lead a worship service, and facilitate workshops.
- Use other worship resources on the UUA website, such as the responsive reading: "We Speak the Language of Love," by Rev. Erika Hewitt.

- Invite a speaker who emphasizes that if we feel unsettled because of someone else's words or actions, we can work on settling ourselves, not depending on anyone else to fix it.
- Make sure that people who leave know that they are free to make their own decisions but they will be welcomed back.

About 16 UUs from the UU Church in Eugene journeyed to Roseburg on June 22 to support their Pride celebration and parade. The celebration was joyful, but pockets of vocal protesters along the parade route held up signs opposing this event and the inclusive nature of the Pride celebration. Some Roseburg UUs stated that there were fewer people marching in the parade and many fewer onlookers this year compared to last year because of fear of the protesters. We

were glad to provide moral support to this wonderful loving community.



UU Fellowship of McMinnville: Address on Militarism and Democracy, by David Delk, Oregon UU Voices for Justice Board Member

On August 4, Oregon UU Voices for Justice board member David Delk addressed the UU Fellowship of McMinnville on Militarism and Democracy. He noted: Each year the U.S. War Budget takes more and more of the federal discretionary budget, with ill effects on the well-being of most Americans. In addition, the whole process of getting to the final figure is undemocratic. What is undemocratic about it and what can we do to both reduce the size of the war budget and make the process more democratic?
